The design was, that, while acquainting yourselves with the languages, customs, and manners of the Ancients; while traversing an extensive range of the difficult and abstruse studies of the Mathematics; while investigating the laws of the Material Universe, as developed in your text books on Astronomy, Geology and the kindred sciences, you might not remain wholly ignorant of the laws of your...
